Greetings Sisters and Brothers,

Shortly after I was born, I attended church. I didn't come in on my own power, I was brought by my parents. John and Birdelle, with both my brothers in tow, walked me up the stairs as I donned a beautiful white dress. Kent Green and Violet Kelly accompanied our ragtag group as we eventually approached the front of the church. We reached the chancel where Rev. Karl, robed in black, stood at the baptismal fount. He greeted my parents and Godparents and began the liturgy for the Sacrament of Baptism.

In that liturgy, he asked by parents and sponsors to take vows to raise me in the church and to protect me until I could take those vows myself. Then, he blessed the water, dipped his hand into the water and touched my forehead 3 times making a cross saying, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and in the name of the Son, and in the name of the Holy Spirit." From that day forward, my life was changed. I was now a Christian, and with that title, I was called to follow the teaching, life and faith of Jesus Christ.

In 1971, I took upon myself the vows that my parents and Godparents took for me at my baptism. To this day, I take those vows very seriously.

Q. Do you desire to affirm your baptism into the faith and family of Jesus Christ?

Q. Do you renounce the powers of evil and desire the freedom of new life in Christ?

A. I do

Q. Do you profess Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior?

A. I do

Q. Do you promise, by the grace of God, to be Christ's disciple, to follow in the way of our Savior, to resist oppression and evil, to show love and justice, and to witness to the work and word of Jesus Christ as best you are able?

A. I promise, with the help of God.

Q. Do you promise, according to the grace given you, to grow in the Christian faith, share regularly in the worship of God, participate in the life and mission of this family of God's people, and to be a faithful member of the church of Jesus Christ, celebrating Christ's presence and furthering Christ's mission in all the world?

A. I promise, with the help of God.



Now, as a Christian who has taken the vows and confirmed his faith in God through Jesus Christ, I am called to live a life of love for all people. To do that, I know that I must sacrifice my anger to God. I must sacrifice my pride to God. I must sacrifice all the things in this life that pull me away from the teachings of Jesus and the desires of God. The more able I am to surrender myself to God, the more my life becomes alive in Christ. There is something else that amazes me every day. When I give and give up, I actually feel the true meaning of a faithful life and I enjoy my life far more than ever before.

Members and friends of Church of Peace, the month of May has a new name, "Match May" with the goal of reducing our Build to Serve principle for our current building loan. The Church Council is now able to use certain funds that were raised at the beginning of our Build to Serve campaign. These funds were placed in an Endowment Fund with Cornerstone so that the church could acquire a loan. Now, since our loan has been transferred to the National Exchange Bank, those funds can now be used to serve as a gift match for our congregation in the month of May. Our hope is that our members will add an additional monetary gift to their normal May Build to Serve payment so that the Endowment Fund can then match both the May payment and the additional gift. This will help reduce the loan principal, which will in turn reduce the amount of interest we pay each month and help us shorten the length of our loan. Please know that your gifts each month keep us on the path to completing our obligation. We could not do this without each and every one of you. Thank you!!!

COUNCIL MINUTES from the March 14, 2023 (minutes taken by Matt Moore

Balance as of February 1, 2023: \$29,081.67 Deposits in February: \$18,444.93 Disbursements in February: \$19,885.52 Balance as of February 28, 2023: \$27,641.08

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

A motion was made by Peter and seconded by Faye to accept the 2/14/2023 council meeting minutes. Motion carried.

Financial Report and Approval of Bills

Bobbi asked about the Communion Fund section on the Abbreviated Financial Report and whether the section name should be changed to improve clarity. The council discuss and the thought was that the section could be called "community fund" as it contains details on more than just the communion fund balance. Bobbi also noted a date typo for the "remaining balance on loan" in the Building to Serve section of the Abbreviated Financial Report. It should be 2/28/2023, not 1/31/2023. Lastly, a mistake was noted on the income and expenses report that appears to be an Excel formula error. This will need to be corrected. A motion was made by Peter and seconded by Bobbi to table financial approvals but approve paying of the bills. Motion carried. The council will meet again after worship service on Sunday 3/19 to discuss.

In the Life of Our Church

Worship

- Pastor Steve reported he will be preaching at the 3/22 Wednesday Lenten service at COP in place of Pastor Ruth.
- 4/2 is Palm Sunday with the Procession of the Palms.
- 4/6 is Maundy Thursday and he needs more volunteers for the re-enactment of the Last Supper. A few council members signed up and 6 members from Pilgrim already volunteered. Practice will be held on Monday 4/3. More details to come.
- 4/9 is Easter Sunday. We will have 2 services at 6:30 AM and 9:00 AM with breakfast after the 6:30 AM service hosted by the Ladies of Peace.
- Ushering: An email from congregation members was shared with the council regarding ushering and the new greeters that have been helping and lack of communication on this process. Other members have voiced concerns as well. The council discussed and agreed to ensure that the comments be addressed. We will continue to use the greeters and it's fine if more than one person hands out the bulletins or greets people. Victor mentioned that if anyone has questions on their duties as an usher or greeter to contact him or Bobbi. Bobbi also mentioned that the council created a list of usher duties (during COVID). We can review that and update accordingly. Pastor Steve reported that more name tags are being printed.

Fellowship Hour: Pastor Steve brought up an idea to help increase participation for hosts for Fellowship Hour – each council member find a family or members who are currently not part of a group that currently hosts, to assemble a new group to host.

Warming Shelter

Pastor Steve requested and received full support from the council to donate cash offering from the 3/22 Lenten Services to the warming shelter to help cover costs for fruit, coffee, creamer, and other supplies being purchased for the warming shelter.

A motion was made by Peter and seconded by Faye to use funds from the Food Pantry to reimburse Jean Stepp for the supplies she has already purchased for the warming shelter. Motion carried. Christian Education: Pastor Steve reported that Heather is doing well and moving forward.

Groups in the Church Family

Ladies of Peace: Bobbi, Faye, and Nancy reported the group discussed rummage sale plans, the Swiss steak dinner on 3/30, and noted that sometime after the Swiss steak dinner they will complete a deep clean of the kitchen.

Golden Fellowship: Faye reported they are having a speaker come to discuss preserving family legacy. Youth: Peter reported the group recently went bowling but there was a low turnout. Their next activity in April will be hiding Easter Eggs throughout the church for the Sunday School children to find. Outreach

- Loaves & Fishes: Jerry discussed the warming shelter at COP with the board. The board asked the Loaves and Fishes hosts to donate the leftovers to the warming shelter.
- River Park: Victor gave an update from the March meeting. Main focus of discussion was what can be done to upgrade the neighborhood.
- Food Pantry: Peter mentioned that the Scouting for Food drive is in April and collections from North Fond du Lac will be coming to the COP food pantry.
- Stewardship Ministry Team: Matt reported the group met last month to discuss the chili cook off plans and discussed timing of other Stewardship events as well.

Scholarship Administration

Justin reported he set up a meeting on Friday 3/17 at 9:00 AM with financial advisors at National Exchange Bank & Trust to discuss how to best invest the Pinkert Fund. The council discussed at length ideas for awarding scholarships.

Church Administration

- A member requested use of the church for a piano recital. A motion was made by Justin and seconded by Bobbi to allow use of the grand piano in the sanctuary. Motion carried.
- A member requested use of the Fellowship Hall for a baby shower on 7/22 from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. The council approved.
- A sign permit has been filed for the new digital sign.
- There have been no volunteers for the Constitution review project. It was suggested that each council member take a copy and make notes with questions and/or potential updates needed. Then we can review as a group.
- New members: Pastor Steve mentioned John and Sandy Sandberg will be inducted this Thursday while in hospice care and Les Abitz and Charlene Abitz will be inducted this Sunday.

Buildings and Grounds

- Discussed the mail drop box that needs to be installed by May. The council agreed to purchase the one recommended by the Post Office along with the post and mounting hardware. The plan is install it on the carport island.
- Victor reported a new rug service delivered rugs and could replace the rugs every 2 weeks. Our rugs have been cleaned as well. The council agreed to have the rug service completed year -round since it's very affordable.
- Peter mentioned he is still working with Mike to schedule a time to install the security cameras. In the meantime, it was mentioned that once worship starts the only door that should remain open is the carport entrance.
- Peter reported he is still working on getting quotes for new and/or rewired kitchen lighting.
- Jerry sent an email about railing in the sanctuary along the stairs leading to the altar. He provided a picture of another church's rails. It is needed but we'll need to determine options and cost.
- Peter reported the ladder going up to the bell tower is unsafe and needs to be replaced and potential safety guard/cage added.
- Peter reported we were notified of three code violations on the church sprinkler system. The cost will be approximately \$1,185 to fix.

Capital Campaign:

Justin mentioned he will be gone for work for most of April and the next meeting with the congregation will be pushed to May which will tentatively be when donations are matched.

We will plan a Building to Serve Appreciation Luncheon on Sunday 6/4 at 11:00 AM

Comments of the Council Members: Bobbi mentioned there are several usher openings for council members to fill.

Next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 11, 2023, at 6:30 PM.

Happy 120th birthday to the "Ladies Society" now called the Ladies of Peace. It was organized in 1903 and the minutes of the group are saved and are in German until 1931.

In 1920 the major Ladies Society fund raiser was the Fall Bazaar which raised \$117.80 and \$332.96 in 1921. They created rag rugs, fancy aprons, and had a baby booth. Dues were 10 cents/ month and the officers were Pres. N. Stroup; VP H. Rutz; Sec'y C. Grauer; Treas. Mrs. Ditter. In 1922 the bazaar garnered \$416.49.

On April 29, 1923 Pastor C.L. Grauer resigned after 13 years of service. At the annual meeting that year they voted to conduct meetings in English. We got a new Organist and Janitor.

A significant motion was carried at a special Meeting to act on 3 candidates for a new Pastor. The women of the church were given the right to vote in 1923 and 114 votes were cast. Rev. Schalow received 103.

In 1943 the Lenten Services were in English. We had 105 members in the Armed Forces. Mrs. Langacker was the Director of the Jr. Choir and got paid \$15 three times a year. In 1943 The Ladies Aid raffled a quilt at 5 cents/name and the winner, Mrs. Therwachter gave it to a children's home. Ladies of Peace




