LETTER FROM PASTOR STEVE.

Greetings Sisters and Brothers,

The months of July and August hold many memories for me, and as I write this, I realize that memories are truly generational. What I mean by that is simply, I have memories of when I was a very young man, a young man, a slightly older young man, an older young man, and a much older young man. I also realize that soon, I will add very much older young man memories.

By now you have noticed that I refer to myself as a young man, and in the grand scheme of things, I am. Okay, some days I don't feel as young as others, and yes, I may be referring to the feeling inside my soul and not my body, because somedays my body does feel a little older, even a lot older somedays. And I guess that is where I began to draw a distinction between my body and my soul, or as Paul might say, spirit. For example, my spirit really wants to get that garage cleaned up today, but my body feels like tomorrow would be a better day. Or maybe my spirit wants to forgive the kid who punched me in the arm, but that spot still hurts, and the body isn't ready yet. Now, I begin to wonder, is this the body I was supposed to get? or was there a mix up at the body store when my spirit was placed in it? Why, well most of the time my spirit feels ready to go! Hmmmm.

How many times have we wanted to do something, but our body wasn't up to the task. It kind of makes you think, who's in charge here? Well, the Apostle Paul helps us when he wrote these words, "The mind governed by the flesh is death, but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace. The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so" (Romans 8:6-7).

Therefore, if my spirit is young and my body is not, a conflict arises. If my spirit likes ice cream, but my body is lactose intolerant, a conflict arises. If my spirit is feminine and my body is masculine, a conflict arises. The last example has become disastrous for many churches, and it should not be a point of destruction, but rather a point of unification. Simply, if we are called to love "one another" then we should simply love without judgement. And as far as judging others lesus tells us,

"Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you" (Matthew 7:1-2).

Let us all love by accepting all people for who they are and by inviting them into the greatest body ever known, the body of Jesus Christ.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE ARTICLE

On June 6-7, Pastor Steve, Jean, Katelyn, and I had the privilege of attending the 2025 UCC Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting at the Green Lake Conference Center. First off, if you have never been to the GLCC, you are missing out! It is absolutely beautiful and peaceful. Perfect for reflection and getting down to business. We all had the opportunity to attend different workshops and learn, grow, and connect with pastors, laypersons, and delegates from across the state. The live music throughout the conference was upbeat and moving thanks to some incredibly talented musicians: The Rev. Andra Moran, The Rev. Dr. Christopher Grundy, The Rev. Jacob Nault, The Rev. Bryan Sirchio (who wrote "Dream God's Dream"), The Rev. Nathan Holst, and Richard Bruxvoort Colligan. We also had the honor to have The Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia A. Thompson speak for the Saturday morning keynote. She is the General Minister, President, and CEO of the United Church of Christ, the first woman and woman of African descent to hold this role. She presents her messages through her poetry, which focuses on faith, hope, unity, and social justice. It was incredibly moving.

The theme of the conference this year was transformation, as told through the life cycle of butterflies. The art team did a fantastic job! On the main stage, there was a butterfly display that changed throughout the days of the conference, with

eggs growing into caterpillars and caterpillars going through the stages of metamorphosis. Every time you looked at it, something had changed. It was super cool! The theme of transformation was moving. There are a lot of challenges facing both the UCC and churches nationwide. To meet those challenges may mean that "church" will look a lot different in the rest of the 21st century and into the 22nd century. But just as a caterpillar goes through the tough "smoothie" stage, as our closing keynote speaker, Rev. Jen Petricca Bloesch, called it, ultimately a beautiful butterfly emerges. It will not always be easy, and it will involve some struggle, but God truly makes all things possible.

Next year the Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting will be moving to April. So, if you haven't ever been, I highly recommend you give it a try -- April 10-11, 2026, at the Green Lake Conference Center.
